Dear Windermere Elementary School families,

Happy Thanksgiving weekend! I hope you have plans to relax, get outside, eat good food and overall, appreciate time with friends and family. October is a busy month in our school. Over the next few weeks, teachers will be collecting assessment information from students in reading, writing, and number sense. We use this information, in combination with classroom assessments and observational data, to create an informal interim report which will be communicated to you at the end of the month. This gives us an understanding of where to support students and allows us to better plan for learning activities and assessments throughout the school year. Our first report card will go out to families mid-December in a formal report card document. As always, please contact your child's classroom teacher if you have any questions or concerns. We know that when parents and teachers work together to support our young people to achieve their goals, they are set up for success in learning and growing throughout their school years.

WES staff support students in their social emotional learning as well as with academics. The Core Competencies are sets of intellectual, personal, and social and emotional proficiencies that all students need in order to engage in deep, lifelong learning. Along with literacy and numeracy foundations, they are central to British Columbia's K-12 curriculum and assessment system and directly support students in their growth as educated citizens. Before students enter school, development of Core Competencies begins at home and then continues throughout their life. Students encounter opportunities to develop their competence in formal and informal settings. They move from demonstrating competence in relatively simple and highly supported situations, to demonstrating independence in more complex and varied contexts. As a staff, we are focusing on supporting students in developing independence in using a toolkit of strategies to help diffuse conflict situations with peers during recess and unstructured times. Over the past two weeks, K-7 teachers used teachable moments within classroom learning to highlight some strategies for students on a common theme: when fun games turn to frustration. You may hear some of this from your child and we appreciate your partnership in supporting the message of using such strategies as: walking away, saying stop, not continuing to play the game, telling an adult and remaining calm.
